FROM THE PASTOR

This week, we have two feasts of Our Lady: Immaculate Conception and Our Lady of Guadalupe. It is for sure a great continuation of Advent to place ourselves, our family, our community and the Country under the mantle of Our Queen.

Advent is truly a time of preparation. Even if the world is making it a commercial event that will end the day Christmas starts, we see the Joy and Peace that come from the time. Every year, people slow down their lives, they take time to prepare the celebration of Christmas. It is the farthest remote way of remembering what is that feast that we know as they do as well. It is a time of hope and particularly as we end the Jubilee placed under that virtue of Hope.

We have a lot to Hope for, the first thing that comes to mind is Peace. We see that some governments are pushing to escalate conflicts in the World forgetting their first role is to protect their people not to engage in conflicts. Beside asking for the conversion of the Nations, it is our duty to pray for them whoever they are. Advent is a great time for that as we are all going to look at the source of our Joy even those who do not believe in Him or love Him. Every single one on earth will be exposed to the Child in the Nativity Scene. We can certain that some will be moved and some will change their mind and love Him. As for us, let us bring Peace and make Peace with all!

The Rorate Mass

The Rorate Mass is a Votive Mass in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, (by indult in some regions or institutes, the Mass *Roráte cæli désuper* is a votive Mass of the 3rd class and may be offered on any liturgical day which is not of the 1st or 2nd class.), which is celebrated by candlelight before dawn during the Advent season. The Mass is called "Rorate" because the Introit for the Mass begins with this Latin word from the book of Isaiah: *Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes pluant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem.*

The origins of the Rorate Masses are certainly linked to the Western tradition of Ember Days, falling during Advent. It was on the Wednesday of the Advent Ember Days that the mystery of the Annunciation was commemorated. On this day, before sunrise, the so-called Missa Aurea – the Golden Mass – was celebrated. In Western Europe, the custom of celebrating this Mass for nine days before Christmas developed, while in some countries – like Germany or Poland – this tradition was extended to the entire Advent period under special privileges granted by the Holy See.

An important element of the symbolism of the Rorate Mass is the Advent lantern. The church is symbolically dark, illuminated by the glow of candles. This beautiful symbolism reminds us of the need to gather good deeds throughout Advent, which can illuminate the darkness of sin, to show Christ the way to our hearts. The lantern also symbolizes Jesus' parable of the wise virgins, who, with burning lamps, awaited the coming of the Bridegroom.

The Blessed Virgin Mary is our guide through Advent until Christmas. In the Introit of the Mass, Mary is compared to the fertile earth, dewed by heaven, which opens and yields the Savior. In the Epistle, we hear the prophecy of Isaiah that the Son of God will be born of a Virgin. In the Gospel, we witness scenes of enduring beauty in the house at Nazareth: "The Word becomes flesh" in Mary. Finally, the Last Gospel summarizes what is fulfilled in us during Holy Mass: "And the Light shineth in darkness... that was the true Light, which enlighteneth every man... he gave them power to be made the sons of God, to them that believe in his name... And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us". These are the purest Advent thoughts.

Parish activities:

Men's group, Women's group, Youth group once a month, Conference on Wednesdays every other week, St. Joseph Men's group work, Saint Ann's meal group, Catechism for Sacraments, Altar boys, Homeschool Co-op twice a week, Adoration twice a week. Volunteering: Not yet in, talk to a priest!

Confessions:

Are heard before each Mass and on demand.

Baptism:

Registered and active parishioners should call well ahead of the baptism to get the form. A class will be provided. The form should be submitted before the ceremony.

Holy Matrimony:

Catholics must be married in the Catholic Church to have a valid marriage in the eyes of God and the Catholic Church. There is a six-month preparation prior the desired date of wedding. It is available for registered and active parishioners.

First Confession, First Holy Communion & Confirmation:

Preparation for the reception of sacraments is available for families registered and active at the parish. The preparation is announced before the beginning of the academic year.
