Adults who didn't receive some sacraments or who have questions about their reception should talk to the Pastor who will advise the candidates.

10. I will give to priests the gift of touching the most hardened hearts.
11. Those who shall promote this devotion shall have their names written in my Heart.
12. I promise you in the excessive mercy of my Heart that my all-powerful love will grant to all those who receive Holy Communion on the First Fridays in nine consecutive months the grace of final perseverance; they shall not die in my disgrace, nor without receiving their sacraments. My divine Heart shall be their safe refuge in this last moment.

Rejoice

The end of June is giving us a lot of feasts: Saint John the Baptist tomorrow, June 29th Saint Peter and Paul, July 1st the feast of the Most Precious Blood.

With the feast of Saint Peter in Paul, it is usually the traditional time of the year, at least in Europe and Africa, where ordinations take place rooting us to the very first Pope and the great and zealous preacher. It is also the day in which all Archbishops of the world will receive the pallium from the Pope. Pallium means cloak. It is a symbol of jurisdiction delegated to them by the Holy See. It is only used at mass over the chasuble of the archbishop in his archdiocese.

If you remember, on January 21st, feast of Saint Agnes, some lambs were presented to the pope to be blessed, then they took the wool out of them. From that moment, the case, with the wool, will rest at the place where are the remains of Saint Peter in the basilica of Rome. It can be seen in the crypt of the basilica. Prior to pope Francis, all new archbishops will travel to Rome and receive it from the hands of the pope on June 29th after an oath. Pope Francis gave that task to the Apostolic Nuncio of the country of the new archbishops. It is a great sign of unity that can be seen on the shoulder of every archbishop of the world.

This week a lot of priests are going to be ordained and will start shortly after their ministry. It is a great opportunity to pray for the new archbishops and the newly ordained priests this week all united in the wonderful feast of Saint Peter and Paul.

FROM THE PASTOR

How long does it take to make a priest? It is a common question people ask. The short answer will be six or seven years of seminary but that will not reflect the reality of a vocation. If we want to investigate a more accurate answer, then we can start looking at first signs of a vocation.

Some will say that a vocation starts on the lap of mother. It is true! Mothers have certainly a crucial role. While parents have the duty to pray that God may call one of their children to the Holy Priesthood or the religious life, they should not interfere. That means, they might see signs, and they should thank God in the secret of their heart. Why? To preserve the freedom of their child. Once the child is ready to make a step toward a seminary or religious life, parents might guide them to a community that is suitable for the child they know well. Before, as people had a Catholic culture, it was possible to guide children properly. Knowing their children, parents were able to guide them to a monastery life in a specific order or to a diocesan seminary or a missionary one. Nowadays, as the culture declined, because religious life is not widespread anymore, it is a challenge.

That is why once a young man enters in the seminary, there is a propaedeutically or spiritual year. That year, before studies, is dedicated to level up the young men to the necessary requirements: prayer life, community life, preparation of studies, and to give them the Catholic culture that is lacking. After that year, the seminarians received the cassock and embark for two years of Philosophy and three or four years of Theology. Beside that intellectual formation, there are other supplements of formation: liturgical, organizational, management, all activities that are based on the community life which has the purpose of helping the future priest in his ministry after ordination.

That proximate formation has a tremendous cost that is why there are calls for financial help for your future priests. It is also our duty to pray for the perseverance of the seminarian and to pray for more vocations!
