FROM THE PASTOR

The Jubilee year ended with the closure of the Holy Door in Saint Peter's basilica by Pope Leo XIV. Another Jubilee was opened by Pope Leo XIV.

Indeed, this year, we will celebrate the 800th anniversary of the death of Saint Francis of Assisi. From Jan. 10th, 2026, to Jan. 10th, 2027, we have an opportunity to gain a Plenary Indulgence. Let's make it exceptional! It can be challenging to understand the true meaning of indulgences. It is not a race or a shortcut as some Catholics imagine collecting them, it is rather an act of Mercy from the Holy Father doing the work of the Catholic Church. A Plenary Indulgence is demanding as it is required, on top of praying for the intention of the Pope the Creed, Our Father and Hail Mary and doing the prescribed exercise, to be detached from sin, venial sin! If not, we still gain a partial indulgence.

How proper it is to benefit from an act of Mercy from the Church for a man who was showing Mercy. It gives us the opportunity to free the heart from the burden of sin and to remit its temporal punishment. This year is a Franciscan year! Be sure to follow the news to see what exercises are prescribed such as visiting a Franciscan shrine, celebrating the feast... What a good idea to discover or rediscover the life of the Poverello of Assisi. What about getting one aspect of his life and making it ours? How are we going to live this year imitating the humility of Saint Francis?

Saint John Bosco, patron saint of youth

John Bosco was born on August 16, 1815, in Becchi. He spent his youth in poverty. When he was 9 years old, God revealed his future mission to him in a mysterious dream. He began to understand and fulfill it in his own way. Seeing how popular itinerant jugglers and circus performers were, with his mother's permission, he would go to places where they performed their tricks and began to imitate them. In this way, he gathered the inhabitants of his neighborhood and entertained, interspersing his performances with prayer, pious singing, and sermons that he delivered.

After completing secondary school, John was accepted into the higher seminary in Turin. Here, under the guidance of St. Joseph Cafasso, his lecturer and confessor, he made significant progress in Christian perfection. On June 5, 1841, he was ordained a priest.

He began to gather lonely young people, teach them the truths of faith, and find work for them with honest people. On Sundays, he gave them the opportunity to attend Holy Mass and receive the sacraments, and afterwards he provided them with entertainment. This apostle of youth is considered one of the greatest educators in the history of the Church. However, he realized that he alone could not accomplish such a great task. To ensure constant care for the youth, he founded two religious orders. Despite being so active, John Bosco managed to find time for prayer and a deep inner life. Endowed with extraordinary charismatic gifts, he remained a humble and modest man. He considered himself a humble instrument of God.

During the canonization process, eyewitnesses described in detail instances of healing the blind, the deaf, the paralyzed, and the incurably ill. However, he gained the most renowned for his gift of reading people's consciences, which he used almost daily, and the gift of prophesying the future of individuals, his congregation, and the Church. He is the patron saint of youth and apprentices.

Parish activities:

Confessions:

Are heard before each Mass and on demand.

Baptism:

Registered and active parishioners should call well ahead of the baptism to get the form. A class will be provided. The form should be submitted before the ceremony.

Holy Matrimony:

Catholics must be married in the Catholic Church to have a valid marriage in the eyes of God and the Catholic Church. There is a six-month preparation prior the desired date of wedding. It is available for registered and active parishioners.

First Confession, First Holy Communion & Confirmation:

Preparation for the reception of sacraments is available for families registered and active at the parish. The preparation is announced before the beginning of the academic year.
