FROM THE PASTOR

On Friday, with the celebration of the feast of Saint Raymond de Peñafort, we celebrate the patron of Canonist. Being a lawyer, he became Professor of canon Law. He was a Dominican priest and became the General Master. Later he cofounded the Mercedarian Order. He was Doctor *in utrumque iuris* and was called to Rome by Pope Gregory IX to compile and harmonize papal Canon Law decisions. He compiled the work in *Decretalium Gregorii IX compilatio, Summa de casibus poenitentiae, Summa de matrimonio...* Back in Spain, he wrote the first manual of Inquisition. His Canon Law work is major for the Church.

Being a canonist and a religious gave him the opportunity to organize the Spiritual, intellectual and disciplinary life of the Church. What a remarkable life: intellectual, spiritual and missionary!

On the Spiritual level, we can ask his intercession for Church life today as Church Law is challenged, and few comply to the Code of Canon Law. In these times of ours, we create situations of disobedience in which we justify ourselves. Our Lord said to the Apostles: "*He that heareth you, heareth me; and he that despiseth you, despiseth me; and he that despiseth me, despiseth him that sent me*" Luke 10, 16. The governance of the Church being of a divine origin with Our Lord as Head and having given the governance to human authorities makes it confusing for some who decide to follow their own conscience and objectively disobey the Church. Benedict XVI exposed on many occasions today's challenges. We can summarize it in the *sequela Christi* that is our duty and life to reach the radicality of the imitation of Jesus Christ.

Saint Timothy, a disciple of Saint Paul

Timothy was a native of Lystra in Asia Minor. Although his father was a pagan, his mother was a Christian and raised him in the Christian faith. When Saint Paul the Apostle and Barnabas came to Lystra, they recognized Timothy's zeal, modesty, and steadfastness, and took him as a companion on their further missionary journeys and as an assistant in preaching the Gospel. Timothy bravely assisted Saint Paul the Apostle in his apostolic work, and Paul often praised him in his letters, calling him a faithful and beloved son. Wherever Christian communities needed strengthening in their faith, the Apostle sent Timothy to remind the newly converted of the teachings of Christ and to strengthen the wavering and fearful.

In reward for his efforts and work, Saint Paul ordained him as a priest, and later as a bishop, entrusting him with the leadership of the church in Ephesus. He also wrote two letters to him, in which he openly acknowledges the great love he had for Timothy. He regretted not having him by his side, as he was a help and comfort to him in his work, but for the needs of the Church, he left him in Ephesus. Finally, in these letters, he instructed him on what a bishop and priest should be like for the people: "But be thou vigilant, labour in all things, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill thy ministry" (2 Timothy 4:5).

After the martyrdom of Saint Paul the Apostle, Timothy continued to serve as bishop in Ephesus for another 30 years, strengthening Christians and converting pagans to the true religion. Seeing that their cause and the worship of the goddess Diana, for whom they had built a magnificent temple, were failing, the pagans tried to revive their idolatry by introducing human sacrifices, public debauchery, and other abominations. Saint Timothy could not stand idly by, so when crowds gathered to watch the obscene games, he blocked their path with a cross in his hand, called for repentance, and pointed out the utter hideousness and abomination of such religious rites. The idolaters did not listen to the venerable bishop, but, enraged that he dared to criticize their rituals, they attacked him and beat him to death with sticks and stones. The feast day of Saint Timothy, bishop and martyr, is celebrated on January 24th.

Parish activities:

Catholics must be married in the Catholic Church to have a valid marriage in the eyes of God and the Catholic Church. There is a six-month preparation prior the desired date of wedding. It is available for registered and active parishioners.

First Confession, First Holy Communion & Confirmation:

Preparation for the reception of sacraments is available for families registered and active at the parish. The preparation is announced before the beginning of the academic year.
