Holy Matrimony:

Catholics must be married in the Catholic Church to have a valid marriage in the eyes of God and the Catholic Church. There is a six-month preparation prior the desired date of wedding. It is available for registered and active parishioners.

First Confession, First Holy Communion & Confirmation:

Preparation for the reception of sacraments is available for families registered and active at the parish. The preparation is announced before the beginning of the academic year. Adults who didn't receive some sacraments or who have questions about their reception should talk to the Pastor who will advise the candidates.

The origin of the Feast is coming from Spain in the 16th century. That devotion was very popular. A religious institute was founded the Fathers of the Precious Blood.

It was the third Superior General of this order, Giovanni Merlini, that happened to be a friend of Pope Pius IX, who suggested to give that feast the universal level. The pope took time to think about but that was without counting on Divine Providence.

Later, on June 30, 1849, the French army conquered the Eternal City. The Roman people begged the Pope, through Merlini, to extend the feast to the universal Church as soon as possible. Two months later the pope instituted the feast on the First Sunday of July. Then, the feast got different level in the liturgy. In the new calendar the feast disappeared. Nevertheless, the devotion remains and is still very popular.

It is the custom, as every dedicated month, to say the Litany of the Most Precious Blood every day. In the Roman Missal, there is a Votive Mass that can be used. The collect is noticeable: "O God, who by the Precious Blood of your Only Begotten Son have redeemed the whole world, preserve in us the work of your mercy, so that ever honouring the mystery of our salvation, we may merit to obtain its fruits. Through Our Lord..."

Let us remember and contemplate all the drops of blood that Our Lord shed for our sins for love of us. The Litany would be a very good and profitable exercise this month.

Blood of Christ, Eucharistic drink and refreshment of souls, *save us*.
